Department of Mathematical Sciences





Dr. Jovani-Catalan studied biology at the Autonomous University of Baja California where he did research in microbiology and mycology, focusing on cellular biology and molecular ecology.

He received his Ph.D. in immunology from the University of California Irvine where he worked on characterizing a new B cell-associated cytokine, interleukin 40. More recently he was a postdoctoral fellow at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai in New York, where he studied how the microbiome, food, and the mucosal immune system in the gut interact to cause inflammation in patients with Chron's disease.

Andrew Conway

Academic Department Head

Andrew Conway is the new Academic Department Head and Professor in the Department of Psychology. Conway's research is aimed at understanding individual differences in cognitive ability. People differ in their cognitive abilities, and these differences matter in life, with respect to academic achievement, job performance, income, and health.

Conway's research is concerned with how cognitive abilities are measured and what role they play in various real-world cognitive behaviors such as learning new information, reading comprehension, and decision making. His overall program of research integrates experimental psychology, psychometrics, and neuroscience. Conway received a B.S. in Computer Science and Psychology from Union College in Schenectady, New York. He then received both his M.A. and Ph.D. in Experimental Psychology from the University of South Carolina. Upon receiving his doctorate, he began teaching at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC), where he served as both assistant and associate professor. From there, he worked as a lecturer, and later as a senior lecturer, at Princeton University. He then joined the faculty at Claremont Graduate University in Claremont, California where he also served as Associate Provost for Research. Conway has won numerous teaching awards throughout his career. In 2001 he was the UIC nominee for USA Professor of the Year, and in 2000 he was awarded the Excellence in Teaching Award from UIC. He is currently Editor in Chief at the Journal of Intelligence.

Ida D'Antonio-Hangen

Ida D'Antonio-Hangen joins the faculty at NMSU after being either an Adjunct or a Visiting Professor since Spring 2019. Born in El Paso, Texas, Ida received her Criminal Justice undergrad degree at the University of Texas at El Paso. After graduating, she moved to Dallas, Texas, to begin her law enforcement career. She was later employed and retired from the FBI after 22 years of service. Before her retirement, she enrolled at NMSU and received her Masters in Criminal Justice.

Ida spent her entire FBI career in Las Cruces, NM. During her time with the FBI, she investigated different types of criminal cases, specializing in Indian country crimes and Human Trafficking. In 2009, she started the Human Trafficking (HT) working group in Las Cruces and her passion has only grown to bring HT awareness to our community. By educating the community, others will be trained on the indicators of HT and possibly be able to rescue a victim. Other passions, besides family, are helping students achieve success in the pursuit of their law enforcement careers. Ida will continue to use her knowledge and experience in the classroom to prepare students for a career in law enforcement, social work, or entering law school.

Dr. Jake Taylor is an Assistant Professor and Director of Choral Studies at New Mexico State University. He serves as conductor of the University Singers, Concert Choir, and Masterworks Chorus. In addition to his conducting responsibilities, he teaches courses in conducting, choral methods, and graduate music education.

Previously, Dr. Taylor was an instructor at Texas Tech University. There he served as conductor of the Matador Singers, director of the Opera Chorus, associate conductor of the Women's Chorale, and co-conductor of the University Choir—TTU's premier choral ensemble. Alongside these positions, he taught courses in vocal pedagogy, choral conducting, and mentored graduate students and pre-service teachers. Dr. Taylor earned his Doctorate of Musical Arts in choral conducting from Texas Tech University, a master's degree in choral conducting, and a bachelor's degree in music education from Stephen F. Austin State University. His recent research focuses on metrical dissonance and other temporal elements in the vocal quartets of Johannes Brahms. He maintains an active schedule as a guest conductor and clinician and has given numerous presentations on score study, conducting gesture, and rehearsal technique.

Department of Mathematical Sciences



Specifically, his research uses algebraic tools in the form of cohomology theories to answer questions in classical geometry, algebraic geometry, and number theory.

Her research perspective is informed by her background. Her research seeks to build an understanding of the systemic disadvantages that hinder the success of marginalized students and their effect on students' chemistry attitudes, opportunities, and learning by using equity-centered theories and methodologies. Her unique combination of Chemistry disciplinary knowledge and educational theory earned her the American Chemical Society's recognition as a Future Leader in Chemistry in 2019, the first time this was awarded to a chemistry education researcher.
